President's Report

The 2022-23 year has been one of reflection, reconnection and rebuilding for IPAA Tasmania, with the development of a new 2023-24 strategic plan focussed on re-engaging with our corporate and individual members, kickstarting our event and content offerings, establishing beneficial partnerships and improving the sustainability of our operations and activities going forward.



First and foremost, we have been busy embarking on a pathway of reconnection with our members. This journey to date has included reaching out to initiate conversations with our corporate members, seeking feedback and inviting input for how we can best deliver value to the Tasmanian public purpose sector going forward.

What we have heard is that organisations currently have a strong focus on building culture and a sense of belonging for their employees. There is revitalised interest and demand for connection across public purpose communities of practice. There is support for IPAA in offering resources and events that enable members to grow professionally, to connect with others and engage with the big picture issues that impact and shape our work.

A key consideration in delivering value for our membership is the need to ensure our networking and professional development offerings are accessible to a broad and diverse audience and our focus this past year has been bolstering an online presence through the IPAA website and offering more virtual programs and material for our members.

Through engagement with IPAA ACT and IPAA National, IPAA Tasmania has been able to offer members the opportunity to access events such as the 2023 IPAA ACT Garran Oration on Trust, accountability and integrity and the IPAA National Summit – Pride in Purpose. We've also been promoting member access to the Australian Journal of Public Administration (AJPA), the IPAA public sector hub and a range of IPAA National podcasts focused on public sector practice opportunities and challenges.

IPAA Tasmania has also been working behind the scenes on the development of our own podcast series aimed at unearthing the stories and experiences of public sector practice in our State. We see this as a great opportunity for members to engage and connect on their own terms and we look forward to commencing the roll out of this series very soon.

I want to take this opportunity to express our appreciation and thanks for the collegial support provided by our colleagues at IPAA National and IPAA ACT, including their guidance and suggestions for leveraging our connections across IPAA Divisions to offer a wider array of online resources for our members.

Operating as a 'working council' in 2022-23, there has been a considerable focus on administrative priorities and a review of current governance arrangements for IPAA Tasmania. Council has undertaken a review of the existing IPAA Tasmania Rules of Association and developed a revised set of Rules that will ensure contemporary alignment with both the current model rules of association under Tasmania's *Associations Incorporation Act 1964* and relevant practices across IPAA Divisions nationally.

The Council determined to rollover annual personal and corporate memberships in 2022-23 in recognition of the need for IPAA to reconnect with members and ramp up its activities. Existing memberships have again been rolled over for 2023-24, however fees for new memberships have been reinstated at an introductory price to ensure that IPAA can re-establish sustainable operations and revenue streams going forward. We will continue to engage with our corporate members over the course of this coming year to review and revise an appropriate corporate membership model going forward.

My sincere thanks are extended to all Council members for their ongoing commitment and contribution to charting IPAA Tasmania's current strategic direction and supporting our rebuilding journey. In particular, I'd like to acknowledge our long-standing Secretary and Public Officer, Jonathan Roe, for his tireless efforts and service over many years. I'd also like to thank Treasurer Jason Sowell and his colleague Loraine Kemble-Smith for the ongoing management of our finances.

I look forward to working alongside Council colleagues and our valued membership in 2023-24 as we continue IPAA Tasmania's 'onwards and upwards' journey to full recovery and activity levels.

Finance Report

Copies of the Financial Statements for the year ended 30 June 2023 are provided with this report.

Pursuant to section 24 of the *Associations Incorporation Act 1964* IPAA Tasmania is exempt from the requirement to obtain an independent annual audit as its annual revenue is below \$250 000.

IPAA operations and finances continued to operate with reduced activity during 2022-23.

Summary points to note from the financial statements are:

- A deficit of \$4,341 for the year was achieved, contributing to total equity decreasing to \$39,816.
- In respect of Income:
 - The Association's council determined that due to the continued impacts of the Covid pandemic that membership fees for 2022-23 financial year would continue to be waived. Revenue for memberships continued to be \$0 for 2022-23 consistent with 2021-22.
 - In addition, there was a reduction in Seminar income to 0 from \$5,159 due to no seminars being held during 2022-23.
- In respect of Expenses:
 - Total expenses decreased to \$5,196 from \$14,426.
 - The decrease mainly related to:
 - a reduction in seminar expenses as no IPAA events were conducted; and
 - a decrease in the DPAC administration fee due to the council undertaking the administration directly.

Given that IPAA Tasmania is still aiming to increase activities for members back to a pre Covid level, the Council approved rolling over all memberships for a third consecutive year to 2022-23.

On behalf of Council I would again specifically like to thank Loraine Kemble-Smith for her voluntary assistance in managing IPAA's finances.

This approach has included leveraging events and conversations being offered through IPAA National and other Divisions.

Key online offerings in 2022-23 have included IPAA ACT's *Frances Adamson Oration* on United Nations Public Service Day, *the 2023 Garran Oration on Trust, Accountability and Integrity* and the IPAA National Summit – *Pride in Purpose*.

In addition to online events, we've also been promoting member access to online resources including the Australian Journal of Public Administration (AJPA), the national IPAA public sector hub and the IPAA National and ACT podcasts series, *Work with Purpose*. IPAA Tasmania has also be working on the development of a Tasmanian-focused podcast series and we look forward to rolling that out soon.

IPAA Tasmania has also been focusing on reinvigorating its face-to-face events and providing tangible opportunities for Tasmanian members to connect. Our recent successful luncheon event, *Frank and Fearless: Public Sector Trust, Integrity and Accountability*, featured Australia Public Sector Commissioner Gordon de Brouwer and the Head of the Tasmanian State Service Jenny Gale, was a complete sell out and a great success. We look forward to delivering more successful events in the year to come.

Institute of Public Administration Australia – Tasmania Division Inc**Notes to the Financial Statement for the year Ended 30 June 2023****Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies****(a) Basis of Preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis that the Association is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. The financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Tas). The Association is an incorporated entity. In accordance with the reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Tas), the Association has complied with the following applicable Australian Accounting Standards and Urgent Issues Group Consensus View of AASB 1031 Materiality. No other applicable Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied. The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

(b) Revenue

Membership subscriptions are recognised as revenue on the issue of membership renewals. Non-renewal of memberships are reversed out of revenue. Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(c) Receivables

Trade and other receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets. Trade and other receivables are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money.

(d) Payables

Trade and other payables are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money.

(e) Goods and Services Tax

(GST) Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the Balance Sheet.

(f) Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax.

(g) Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

A PLAN FOR RECONNECTING AND REBUILDING


